Thank you very much for taking part in this study. The aim of our research is to find out if the therapy we have developed is effective at helping people with Multiple Sclerosis manage any cognitive problems they have as a result of the illness.

This newsletter is being sent to all the participants in the trial and the content we will share in this will be connected to multiple sclerosis. One thing which won't be in it is any discussion of the therapy. The reason is the trial has two groups, Group "A" which is getting the therapy now, and Group "B" which will get the therapy once the trial is complete. We have prepared a video about how participants have been randomly allocated to these two groups <u>here</u>, and the People's Trial have one too (you can see it <u>here</u>).

### **MS RESEARCH IN NUIG**

Dr. Una FitzGerald is the head of an MS Research Group in NUIG. Last year the group was successful in getting €3.9 million to train researchers in developing new treatments for progressive MS.

The researchers are from Denmark, Germany, Belgium, France, Italy, Spain and the Czech Republic and the aim to develop novel devices and treatments to help people with advanced MS. It is hoped there will be 15 projects funded and they will cover biomaterials, neuroimmunology, stem cell biology, neurological disease, biomarkers, computer modelling of cerebrospinal fluid flow and medical device design.

# Finding the best way to test if a new therapy works

Before we started recruiting for COB-MS we developed a video to explain this concept. It is one of the key legs of our trial and it is a process we hope to explain to everyone involved in the trial. Our video can be found <u>here</u>.

Another trial, The People's Trial, (see www.peoplestrial.ie) has now finished. It was a small online trial and was conducted by researchers in NUIG. They too created a great video about Randomisation and you can view it here. (https://thepeoplestrial.ie/phase-four/) We want to have two groups of people with MS which are as close to identical as possible. One of these groups will receive the therapy, and the other doesn't until after the study is finished. We will be testing both groups before we start, to create a baseline. This will be completed by Eimear & Fionnuala. When Group A finishes receiving the treatment Fionnuala will test both groups again. This testing will happen at different stages thought the trial.

Group B (the Control Group) will not receive the therapy and so should reflect what would happen to the cognition of the average person with MS if they just continue life with no changes. We believe Group A will have a better cognitive outcome than Group B. If this happens, it will indicate the trial therapy is effective. If there is no difference between the two - or people are worse in Group A, it would suggest the therapy doesn't work, or has a negative effect.

In our trial once the testing period has finished, everyone in Group B will receive the therapy too, free of charge. It is a 'thank you' for taking part. Both groups in this trial are
